Meet Maria

"It's a blessing to be here."

Maria raved about the mostaccioli that a volunteer Guest Chef made on a recent weekend. "It's a noodle," she said in a playful tone that hinted that perhaps her diet didn't allow too much pasta, "but it was so good."

Last fall, Maria moved in to the Good Life Senior Residences at Nathalie Salmon House where she has privacy when she wants and assistance when she needs it.

Maria is a friendly person who enjoys meeting and engaging in activities with volunteers, staff, and other residents. She especially likes movie nights,



music, and taking walks. She loves her private room which she describes as clean, cheerful, and bright.

"It has big windows and nice furniture," she says. She proudly welcomes others to her room to see the view and points out the photos of her daughter on the dresser. "[Good Life Senior Residences] is a place where you can learn and grow—change. It's a good environment where we respect one another."

Before Maria heard about H.O.M.E., she lived alone in a studio apartment where she didn't have a lot of chances to meet and talk with others. One of her first impressions of Nathalie Salmon House was that she would have more opportunities to socialize. She liked that idea. And she says the people she has met at H.O.M.E. are what make it so great.

In addition to feeling isolated before moving in to Nathalie Salmon House, Maria's old studio apartment was growing too expensive for her fixed income. She said that it was tough to afford her rent along with paying for groceries. So when she learned that amenities at Good Life Senior Residences included meals and home supplies, she felt relieved.

If she had not found H.O.M.E., Maria fears that she would be "somewhere bad, and very expensive."

Now she is able to manage her finances, enjoys meals with her neighbors, and gets help with other day to day things as she needs it. Maria struggles with anxiety, but she says she's less nervous than she was when she was living alone and that she's on the "road to recovery."

"It's a blessing to be here. . . It's a good place to be. It's been perfect so far."



Financial Overview


Total Revenue \$2,989,695


